The Future Pattern of Secondary Education – Academies

**PROPOSAL TO TRANSFORM JOHN KITTO COMMUNITY COLLEGE INTO
AN ACADEMY**

On the 1 September 2010, Plymouth City Council (PCC, “the City Council”) proposes to replace John Kitto Community College (JKCC, “the College”) with a Church of England sponsored Academy, on the same site. Under this proposal, JKCC would close on 31 August 2010 to enable the Academy to open, and this decision was subject to consultation which opened on 18 June 2009 and closed on 24 July.

The City Council considered the views submitted in this first stage of the consultation and decided to proceed with the closure of JKCC and the opening of the Academy. The next step is to issue a closure notice. This will be withdrawn if, for any reason, it is not possible to proceed with the Academy.

All of the proposals are subject to the Secretary of State signing an agreement to enable the Academy to be opened, should this not go ahead then the proposal will not proceed.

The attached document - *Matters to be Specified In Section 15 Proposals To Discontinue A School* - is the ‘prescribed information’ specified by the Department for Children, Schools and Families (DCSF) that sets out the information that the proposer - Plymouth City Council - must provide about a proposal when a closure notice is issued. A closure notice was published on Wednesday 16 September 2009.

Consultation

3. *A statement to the effect that all applicable statutory requirements to consult in relation to the proposals were complied with.*

The City Council published material to explain the proposal, including a summary of and timeline for the statutory procedures, and allow interested parties to respond to and express a view on the proposal. The proposal is also conditional on the Secretary Of State making an agreement for an Academy to be opened on the existing site of the Community College with a planned implementation date of 1 September 2010.

The consultation opened on 18 June 2009 and closed on 24 July 2009 and Council officers/Senior School Staff held an informal drop-in question and answer session at John Kitto Community College on Wednesday 15 July 2009 to provide the opportunity for interested persons or organisations to ask questions about any aspect of the proposal.

- b) It was decided not to hold public consultation meetings, however an informal drop-in session was held at John Kitto Community College on 15 July 2009 and the comments received were incorporated in the summary of responses. A meeting was also held at John Kitto Community College on 8 July to provide staff, parents and governors with an opportunity to meet the sponsors and understand more about the proposed Academy.
- c) Eighty-eight responses were received to the consultation on proposals relating to the closure of both John Kitto Community College and Tamarside Community College with 40 in support, 25 not in support and 23 undecided. Of these 43 responses related to John Kitto Community College with 23 in support, 9 not in support and 11 undecided. Comments from those in support of the proposals pointed to the benefits of providing a high class environment for the children to learn and achieve, helping to regenerate the local community, bringing innovation and investment into the City, providing real choice for parents wishing to send their children to a CE sponsored school, and encouraging parents and future students to choose a local

school rather than travelling across the City.

Comments from those that do not support the proposals included the lack of proof that academy status is an effective strategy to improve student achievement, that the process is disruptive and will undermine staff morale, that giving money to a school will not improve exam results, that the negative side of the proposal has not been fully explained to enable an informed choice to be made, and that there is no security for staff.

Comments from those who are undecided relate to concerns about the lack of information available to staff about future staffing structures, terms and conditions and union representation, the track record of academies, the smoothness of transition and disruption to students from building work, what would happen if sponsors pulled out, and how academy status would raise standards.

Objectives

5. *The objectives of the proposal.*

By replacing John Kitto Community College with an Academy, the City Council's objectives will be :

- to regenerate the communities served by the College;
- to accelerate the improvement and raising of standards that have taken place in the College in recent years;
- to provide outstanding facilities for community use throughout the year.

Standards and Diversity

6. *A statement and supporting evidence indicating how the proposals will impact on the standards, diversity and quality of education in the area.*

At the same time as the Council has been considering the Strategy for Change, the Department for Children, Schools and Families (DCSF) has identified five schools in the Local Authority which are achieving at or below 30% in both English and Maths at KS4 as National Challenge Schools (2008).

The National Challenge programme requires Local Authorities to consider transformational change programmes as a means of securing rapid academic progress in GCSE results.

John Kitto Community College faces significant challenges both in terms of buildings that can provide 21st Century education and in terms of delivering high levels of attainment whilst serving areas of high levels of social economic disadvantage. In order to address both factors officers have been in discussion with school governors and potential sponsors about the viability of securing transformational change at both schools through the National Academies programme.

The Council expects that a BSF programme for Plymouth will:

- create more choice and diversity in the pattern of secondary school

provision through introducing academies, foundation schools and federations;

- provide a pattern of viable schools with state-of-the-art facilities for teaching and learning;
- present significant opportunities to maximise the benefits of extended services for children, parents and local communities.

The range of secondary schools available in Plymouth – comprehensive (including Trust Schools), selective and faith schools – will continue to provide a true mix of abilities and social backgrounds.

Provision for 16 -19 year olds

7. Where the school proposed to be discontinued provides sixth form education, how the proposals will impact on—

- (a) the educational or training achievements;

for 16-19 year olds in the area.

All pupils on roll will continue their schooling at the newly opened Academy and the full range of education and training opportunities will be maintained, in order that the continued acceleration of improvement and raising of standards that have taken place in the College in recent years continues into the future.

Need for places

8. *A statement and supporting evidence about the need for places in the area including whether there is sufficient capacity to accommodate displaced pupils.*

Plymouth is served by a diverse range of 16 secondary schools, including 9 Community Comprehensive, 2 Secondary Trusts, 3 selective and 2 voluntary aided schools, but the number of secondary-age pupils across the City is falling. The numbers in Years 7-11 are forecast to fall by 10% over the next 5 years, a drop of almost 1,500 pupils – roughly equivalent to an average-size comprehensive school. As a result Parkside Technology Community College closed in August 2008.

It is envisaged that all pupils on roll at John Kitto Community College will continue their schooling at the newly opened Academy.

Current School Information

Displaced Pupils

11. Details of the schools or further education colleges which pupils at the school for whom provision is to be discontinued will be offered places, including—

- (a) any interim arrangements;

There is no anticipated need as the school is being replaced on the site. However where a parent or carer seeks a place at another school, the application will be successful if there is a vacancy in the relevant year group and, in the case of a selective school, the child qualifies for admission.

Impact on the Community

13. A statement and supporting evidence about the impact on the community and any measures proposed to mitigate any adverse impact.

The proposal for an Academy to replace John Kitto Community College will address the imbalances in achievement between different parts of the City and will ensure that investment will be targeted so that benefits address these imbalances. The proposal also addresses the link between education and the community; in particular it supports the link between school environments and the promotion of high class sporting facilities for the City. The Academy Programme will include capital investment through Building Schools for the Future (BSF) to dramatically improve the school's learning environment and is focussed on raising attainment and continuous improvement hence improving life chances.

The proposal is targeted to ensure that all communities have outstanding opportunities. There will be no need to travel long distances for school places and parental choice will be upheld.

14. Details of extended services the school offered and what it is proposed for these services once the school has discontinued.

The new Governing Body of the proposed Academy will deliver the full range of extended services.

Travel

15. Details of length and journeys to alternative provision.

All Schools/Colleges are within easy reach of each other and a comprehensive public transport system helps to ensure that a number of schools are accessible.

16. The proposed arrangements for travel of displaced pupils to other schools including how they will help to work against increased car use.

We anticipate that there will not be any displaced pupils. All pupils on roll will continue their education at the newly opened Academy on the school site. The new Academy will develop a School Travel Plan aimed at reducing car usage.
