Tin glazed earthenware or Delft was a very popular material in the 1700s. Like this vase, much was painted in Blue and White which made it look a bit like Chinese porcelain.

As no-one in Europe knew how to make porcelain at this time, Delft became a popular alternative.

The design on the front gives away its origins (in Holland): did you spot the windmill?

### ***Tulip Vase***

Did you guess this one?!

It is a tulip vase. The 5 'necks' across the top would hold a flower each.

It was sometimes known as a 'Quintal' meaning '5'.

This picture shows the design of some boats on the back of the vase.

This tulip vase was made by a small factory in the North of Holland.

## When?

1690 - 1720

## Material?

It is made of tin glazed earthenware. This is also known as Delft after a small town in Holland where it was popularly produced.

The blue paint for the decoration was made from Cobalt.
