SUMMARY OF RESPONSES

This is a summary of some of the key issues emerging from the consultation process. Fuller versions of the representations can be viewed below.

Two representations were received from residents, who thought that the summary of the neighbourhood was a reasonable reflection of the situation.

Shopping

It was felt that the lack of a local shopping centre was not an issue, as there are adequate shops nearby. Parking by one stop shop on Goosewell road can be an issue

Local Issues

The availability and preservation of greenspace came top of the lists. Public transport, particularly frequency of services on Sunday, and access to Derriford was singled out as being of concern.

Important Greenspaces

Absolute need to preserve green space for recreation, dog walkers and children's play, and to maintain the feeling of being on the urban fringe.

G03 needs more seats and measures to stop cars driving on it.

Possibly require more smaller units for the elderly, single people and youngsters.</p> <p>Public transport – big issue and potential opportunity. We would need one less car in the family if a frequent service existed to Derriford hospital. It is hopeless at present; no one can make it work by having to travel into town and then out, not practical. It could run from the Broadway perhaps?
